Abstract

Starting a new clinical program in a large, academic children's medical center was challenging. Starting basically two separate programs at the same time was even more challenging. As the primary clinical psychologist whose specialty is infants and young children, a new program had to be established and lessons were learned from educating faculty about the specialty in and of itself, convincing management of its importance, staffing the programs, needs for creativity in service and funding avenues. Once the programs were established, they were busy and, thus, understaffed. Again, creativity in service and funding steams was a needs to pivot from traditional models of service and interventions, and to be creative with methods and staffing the services. Ways to start a program from scratch, how to advocate for a program and how to sustain it with limited resources will be shared and discussed.
